
I ask that you sign up for the prayer banner, send palanca, and pray for our guests and our team. This power will be felt on the weekend.

What's Happening?

Children of Zion Outreach

The daughter of **Carol Fulton** (NCP # 46) would come home from school and talk to her mom about her encounters with teenage moms and their babies. Carol felt the strong urge to try to do something to help these young mothers learn good parenting skills and to stay in school. Thus '**Children of Zion Outreach**' got underway in Carol's home with three teenage moms and one teenage father. Over the years, Carol's vision grew and expanded into the local recreation centers and neighborhoods. Urged by the police department, she took her mission into an area with high-risk youth and gangs.

The number of homeless young people caused her to get involved with the **Homeless Council**. COZ (Children of Zion) is now providing three separate ministries; the teen parents, the at-risk youth and the poor and/or homeless. Her long range goal is to establish an '**Elizabeth's House**' for homeless teen-aged moms. Carol notes that the Biblical Elizabeth was the first recorded individual to provide shelter for the teen-aged mom 'Mary'. For at-risk youth, she envisions a self-run center with an adult advisory board. This would be called the '**Construction Zone**'.

Carol asks for our prayers to help continue this work, noting that it was 'given birth' through prayer and through prayer has grown and flourished. She also knows that monetary assistance is needed to continue to help feed, clothe and take these young people on field trips and retreats. Baby supply items are in constant need. And volunteers are needed. Carol invites you to check out her website – cozoutreachministry.org. It's full of information!

Out of the Garden Project

Don and Kristy Milholin's children attend an elementary school in Greensboro that has a large number of children receiving free or reduced cost lunches and breakfasts. Concerned that these children and their families were not getting proper meals during the weekend, Don (NCP # 11) and Kristy (NCP # 9) in 2009 began offering food to ten children. Soon other parents offered their help. One volunteer established a 501c3 non-profit status for them. In 2010, they added two more schools and by the end of the 2011 school year they were serving 22 Guilford County Schools, providing over 330 bags of food every Friday.

Don, Kristy and their volunteers currently serve 31 schools, including two high schools and three middle schools, distributing **two and a half tons** of food **every week** to over 600 students for them to take home Friday afternoons in their backpacks. One in four children in North Carolina is at risk of hunger.

This "**Out of the Garden Project**" receives donations of food and money from

individuals and organizations that want to help make a difference in these children's lives. Don and Kristy are seeking donations and volunteer help to shop, pack bags and deliver the bags to the schools. Connected in Hope Foundation

Each day thousands of women and young girls leave their homes in Addis Ababa, Ethiopia and climb two thousand feet up Mount Entoto to collect eucalyptus branches from the forest floor. They tie the wood into bundles almost two feet in diameter and 5 to 6 feet long. The women then carry these bundles weighing 75 to 80 pounds the 10 miles down the mountainside to sell the firewood to the markets of Addis Ababa for less than a dollar. They all lack the education and financial resources necessary to make income alternatives a reality. One third of these women wood carriers are between the ages of 10 and 19.

Pam (NCP #85) and **Ron Simpson** (NCP #85) traveled to Ethiopia in 2009 when their daughter adopted their seven-month old Ethiopian grandchild, Joseph. They immediately developed a deep love and respect for the people of Ethiopia, and a compelling desire to give back to this beautiful land and its people.

Subsequent trips to Ethiopia brought them face-to-face with the women wood carriers. They learned about the tremendous challenges facing the women in their efforts to provide even the most basic needs of food and shelter. The experience left Ron and Pam forever changed and committed.

Connected in Hope Foundation was incorporated in North Carolina and received its official 501c3 nonprofit status in early 2010. Alternative, predictable and sustainable income sources were identified after lengthy conversations with the women wood carriers.

Today, sixty former fuel wood carriers are weaving beautiful scarves and baskets that Connected in Hope Foundation (CHF) has introduced to global markets. Beginning by selling on-line they were soon coordinating sales in the US, Kenya, Italy and Brussels. The women's income quadrupled! CHF pays the weavers up front for their products, reinvesting the proceeds from sales into programs that benefit the women and their families.

Potter's House Community Center

Children of men incarcerated at the Forsyth County Correctional Center were having difficulty in school as well as integrating socially. **John Young** (NCP 11) saw this as a prison chaplain and in 1966, he and his wife **Pansy** (NCP 11) opened their home to twenty children who came from single parent homes, parents were incarcerated, children living with grandparents of great-grandparents, parents who abused drugs or who's parent(s) were deceased. These children, they found, were starved for love and attention.

John devised a program directed at meeting their needs, and at the end of ten weeks, they saw improvement in the children's behavior and academic skills. But still other needs waited to be addressed; needs not even envisioned. Many grandparents were not able physically or financially to make sure they were accessing the resources available within the public school system that address the child's academic or social problem. John and Pansy began assisting the parents and guardians. Other crisis still loomed. Employment problems, housing, lack of medical attention, teen pregnancy, lack of mentoring, low levels of education and more...

In 1998, John and Pansy felt God's leading them to work in one of the poorest neighborhoods in Winston-Salem. They were moved by Luke 10 to become 'innkeepers for the Lord' and by Jeremiah 18 to call their refuge '**Potter's House**' where God is able to reconcile broken lives. As time went on, they saw improvement in the neighborhood: abandoned properties were removed, un-cared for vacant lots, poor street maintenance, crime and other ills of the neighborhood were addressed

The zoning office of Winston-Salem was concerned with the use of the property that housed Potter's House and John and Pansy were required to close that location. Though the programs offered by Potter's House still exist, their efforts have been stifled by the lack of a facility. They have since purchased property near their original location on which they will construct a new '**Potter's House Community Center**'. They have an architectural plan and a contractor. The building will have a multi-purpose room seating 90 people, a commercial kitchen, a computer lab and classroom space. They need to raise funds to begin the construction.

Peacehaven Community Farm

Buck Cochran (NCP # XXX) has long had an interest in people with disabilities and the ministry of L'Arche communities that provide a space to pair residents with assistants. Buck and his wife Cathy (NCP # XXX) are parents of a child with special needs and have experienced the joys, heartaches, the quest for a 'fix', and the awe and wonder of having someone they love with intellectual disabilities become all they were meant to be.

With another couple they began the search that in 2007 led them to what is now called **Peacehaven Farm** in Whitsett, North Carolina. They set out with the desire for Peacehaven to be a healing place for those with disabilities and their families. With that in mind, Peacehaven Farm was created to celebrate people with intellectual and physical disabilities – not to simply *accommodate* them. On a farm everyone is needed and everyone can contribute. Peacehaven residents will soon live in homes and share meals with other community members around a dining room table.

Placed in a beautiful setting of rolling, wooded hills with lakefront access, Peacehaven is immediately identifiable by the large white barn with the Peacehaven logo located just off Highway 61 a mile and a half south of I-40/85. The farm produces organic vegetables, beef, pork, eggs, chicken and wool.

Peacehaven Farm is a non-profit incorporated in the state of North Carolina as a 501c3. The needs of Peacehaven change from time to time and season to season.
